

11. Donations

For those who maybe interested in the NSW Historic and Classified Vehicle Registration Scheme, there are two categories, 'historic' and 'classic' (conditional).

While both classifications require that the vehicle be 30 years of age or older, to qualify for 'historic' registration, the vehicle must be close to factory condition, ie., not modified to a degree where it needs to be engineered and carry a modification plate.

Vehicles outside of the 'historic' classification category are registered under the 'classic' (conditional) category. This plate is a different style of plate to the historic one and is embossed with the word 'Conditional'.

These vehicles are modified and must be engineered and carry a modification plate to cover such modifications.

Whilst the registration fee for both classifications is the same, about \$59.00, heavy penalties apply to the owner of a modified vehicle displaying historic 'H' plates.

It's a bit of a catch for if a person has a vehicle which is almost stock, the wheels, for example, being the only mod in that they are wider or larger in diameter than factory, it has to be engineered before going onto the 'conditional' scheme. The only out is to refit the standard-type wheels and put the car onto the historic scheme.

Once doing this, and should the owner then refit the non-standard wheels, the penalty is high should the owner be caught. In NSW the police and the RMS inspectors know the rules and are vigilant.

RUN ETIQUETTE

To ensure that their vehicle has adequate fuel to reach the destination or the next planned fuel stop. Refuelling the vehicle should be done before refuelling oneself! Run departures will not be delayed for those vehicles needing last-minute fuel particularly if there has been an ample opportunity to fill-up before the run departs.

Urged to be on time for the commencement of the run and/or event. Should a member be running late and wishes to commence the run with the group, he/she should contact the run coordinator. Similarly if members wish to join en-route.

Urged to keep together wherever possible, particularly in built-up areas. This will minimise the necessity of continually stopping to regroup which can be hazardous. It is realised that keeping together in built-up areas can be difficult, but often those caught at traffic lights will catch-up to those in front as they themselves are slowed by lights.

Not permitted to overtake the designated run leader. However participants may move about within the group, overtaking when safe and legal.

Encouraged to remain with the group until the agreed dispersal point at the end of the event. This also applies to static events such as car shows.

Encouraged to carry a small portable UHF CB radio and set to Channel 9. Such radios are relatively inexpensive, and have ranges varying from around one to five kilometres. They are invaluable and a medium by which to keep informed about what is going on, and to let the group know if you have become separated or broken-down.

Historic vehicles—proof of eligibility

Club membership - You require evidence, at the time of application, of current membership with a Queensland incorporated vehicle club or association to be eligible for this concession. **This membership should be maintained while the vehicle is registered under the scheme.** Your club can provide evidence of your current membership, which needs to:

be on club letterhead

include details of your vehicle (make, model, year and chassis number)

be signed by a club official.

Vehicles other than historic ambulances and fire-fighting equipment vehicles must be registered in the name of the club member (individuals only). However, Transport and Main Roads may also approve incorporated historical societies with a recognised interest in vehicle heritage to register eligible vehicles under the scheme. Such applications are considered on a case-by-case basis. Contact your nearest <u>transport and motoring customer service centre</u> or <u>QGAP office</u>, <u>Magistrates</u> <u>Court</u> or local <u>police station</u> that provides vehicle registration services for more information.

Dating certificate (if applicable) - A dating certificate is only required if the Department of Transport and Main Roads cannot verify the date of manufacture for your vehicle (from an existing or previous vehicle record, import papers, or from the identification or manufacturer's plate). If a dating certificate is required, a dating officer (or club official) from a Queensland incorporated vehicle club or association will need to certify the vehicle's authenticity and year of manufacture. This must be on club letterhead or other official club documentation and include details of the vehicle (make, model, year and chassis number).

Street rods and hot rods—proof of eligibility

Club membership – Registered operators must retain current membership with the Australian Street Rod Federation (ASRF). Compliance with this requirement may be verified at any time by TMR officers.

Compliance – Street rods must comply with all the specifications contained in the ASRF Queensland Street Rod Guidelines.

Modifications – If a street rod that is registered under the special interest vehicle registration concession scheme is modified in any way, it must be certified and replated under the LH9 or LH10 section of the Queensland Code of Practice – Vehicle Modifications.

Supporting documentation – The Queensland State Director of the ASRF must supply documentation certifying the vehicle was manufactured before 1949, or is a replica of a vehicle manufactured before 1949, and the applicant is a current member of the ASRF.

Historic ambulances and fire-fighting equipment vehicles (no age limit) —proof of eligibility

There is no age restriction for historic ambulances and fire-fighting equipment vehicles.

To be eligible for registration under the Special Interest Vehicle Registration Concession Scheme, historic ambulances and fire-fighting equipment vehicles must be registered in the name of one of the following:

an incorporated fire brigade

an incorporated ambulance service

a current member of an incorporated ambulance historical society or fire brigade historical society (proof of this membership is required on letterhead or other official documentation).

a current member of an incorporated vehicle club if vehicle is 30 years of age or more (proof of this membership is required on letterhead or other official documentation).

Club membership exemptions

If you live in a remote area or unable to access an appropriate club, you may be eligible for an exemption for the club membership requirement. All exemptions will be considered on a case-by-case basis. Contact your nearest <u>transport and motoring customer service centre</u>or <u>QGAP office</u>, <u>Magistrates Court</u> or local <u>police station</u>that provides vehicle registration services for more information.

Special interest vehicle scheme

Conditions and restrictions

You and anyone driving your special interest vehicle must only use the vehicle for:

- participating in rallies organised by incorporated vehicle clubs or events sanctioned by the Australia Street Roc Federation (ASRF). Note: a rally is a social event whereby a parade of special interest vehicles travel together for competition or to meet at an agreed location. Rallies are usually listed in a incorporated club newsletter or on the incorporated club's website or social media page.
- participating in processions for which a Special Events Permit has been issued under the Transport Operations (Road Use Management –Accreditation and Other Provisions) Regulation 2015
- exhibiting the vehicle in displays, fetes or similar functions conducted for religious, charitable or educational puposes
- ceremonial purposes (such as weddings, formals, funerals) involving immediate and de facto family members, or as part of a sanctioned incorporated club event, provided this is not done for fee or reward. Immediate and de facto family means parents, grandparents, sons, daughters, grandchildren, adopted children and adopted grandchildren, but not extended family members such as aunts, uncles, nephews and nieces
- preparing for, proceeding to, and returning from the above activities
- direct travel to and from an approved inspection station to get a safety certificate or certificate of inspection before offering the vehicle for sale
- travel in order to have the vehicle repaired. There is no distance restriction, however such travel must be reasonable and justifiable by the vehicle operator
- road testing within a 15km radius from the place where the vehicle is garaged or is being repaired. The purpose of the travel must be to road test the vehicle following repair or restoration, or for general vehicle maintenance and not for any other purpose. This does not include use as an everyday means of transport. A passenger may travel if your vehicle to assist with road testing—only if your vehicle can legally carry passengers.

Buses are permitted to carry non-fare paying passengers for journeys (joy-rides) from an event (for example, a fete) and return provided the length of the journey does not exceed 5km. Payment of any kind cannot be received for these journeys.

Heavy vehicles over 4.5t GVM are permitted to carry a load provided the loaded GVM or gross combination mass (GCM) does not exceed 50% of the maximum permitted mass for the vehicle configuration. This mass is based or the lesser of:

- Individual axle ratings
- Tyre manufacturer's limits
- Manufacturer's GVM or GCM
- Regulation mass limits.

If your special interest vehicle does not have permanent lighting, you must carry a removable lighting system with the vehicle at all times and use that system whenever lighting would normally be required. Carbide lights are acceptable where that type of light was originally fitted.

Majze, Potatoes, Pumpkins and Melons, Arrowroot, Grapes, Bananas, Pineapples, Oranges, Custard Apples, Paw Paws, Cape Gooseberries, Lemons, Mangoes, Passion, Pounts, Persimmons, Plums, Peanuts, Vegetables, Beans, Cabbages, Cauliflowers, Cucumbers, Peas, Tomatoes, are produced. Thirty-three per cent. of the the total production of Grapes comes from this area, and fifty-five per cent. of the Pineapples grown, are produced in the Metropolitan area.

Dairying: More than half the milk produced round the City is used for consumption as Milk, and about 16 per cent. of the total is used by the producers themselves, the Milk produced in a given district has little bearing on the amount of Botter made in that district, as Dairymen send their cream to the factory that they think gives them the best deal and a very large quantity is received in Brisbane from other places, and over three and a quarter million pounds of Eutter were made in the district, although less than one million gallons of Milk cut of the total production was used for that purpose, the balance required being received from elsewhere. The Silverwood Dairy Factory Co. Ltd. Brisbane, have a Butter Factory at Roma St., Brisbane. The Queensland Meat Export and Agency Co. at Pinkenba, and the Premier Butter Factory at South Brisbane.


Timber: There is very little Milling Timber left in this locality now, but Bally Gum. Ironbark, Bloodwood, Turpentine, Stringybark, White Gum, are dotted here and there. There are still trees large enough for house blocks, but these are rapidly disappearing and Timbergetters will have to go farther affield. There are 15 Sawmills in the Brisbane and South Brisbane Police Districts.

Important establishments are the C.S.E. Refinery, at New Ferm; Woolwashing, Messrs. Baynes Bros., Belmont; L. Bardeley, Logan Road, Mt. Gravatt; Ithaca Woolscour, at Kelvin Grove; Bacon Factories, Messrs. J. C. Hutton and Co., Zillmere; Messrs. Foggitt, Jones, and Co., Oxley; Meat Preserving Works, Q.M.E. and A. Co. Ltd., at Pinkenba; Messrs. Baynes Bros., at Hemmant; Messrs. Birt and Co., at Barula; Messrs. Berthwick and Sons Ltd., at Hemmant. There is also a Distillery at Strathpine.

The Secondary Industries consist of Tanneries, Woolwashing, Fellmongering, Soap and Candles, Brick, Marble Works, Pottery, Box Making, Cooperage, Joinery, Saw milling, Blacksmithing, Brass and Copper Smithing, Engineering and Foundries, Railway Workshops, Stove Making, Sheet Metal Working, Baeon Curing, Butter Making, Meat Preserving, Biseuit Making, Confectionery, Grain Mills, Jam. Pieleles, Sauces and Vinegar Making, Sugar Refining, Acrated Waters, Breweries, Condinents etc., Ice Making, Tobacca Pactory, Boots and Shoes, Clothing, Dressmaking and Millinery, Dye Works, Hatz and Caps, Shirts and Underclothing, Bags, Sacks etc., Tents, Paper Box Making, Printing and Lithographing, Coachbeilding, Saddlery, Leatherware, Boat Building, Beddling and Upholstery, Furniture and Cabinet Making, Picture Frame, Chemicals, Surgical and Scientific Instruments, Jewellery etc., Electric Apparatus, Brushes and Brooms and other minor wares. Over 30 per cent. of the total Manufactories are situated in the Metropolitan area.

Tips for Tourists: Visitors to Brisbane will find much to interest them. The Botanic Gardens and University Grounds situated at the Eastern end of the North City are worth more than a passing visit. The Public Library in William Street has some very valuable boks for those who run to read. The Museum at Bowen Park and the Acclimatisation Seciety's grounds near by are too good to be missed. The Art Gallery situated in the Executive Building, though small, helds some treasures. The New Government Printing Office, the Executive Building, the Treasury Buildings and some of the modern Trading establishments are also worth a visit. The Tramway system, though at present hampered by restrictive legislation, is one of the best in the Commenwealth, and for eleanliness and civility of employees is far ahead of any other, a ride from North Quay to Ascot, to Clayfield to New Parm and to Bowen Bridge is worth the fare charged. From the Custom House to Toowsong, to Red Hill and Pacdington Heights will well repay the time spent ever the trips. From the Toowsong terminus, a short, but enjoyable walk, takes one to Mt. Caotha or One Tree Hill, where on a clear day, a magnificent view can be obtained of the currounding country on far South as the border, Ipswich on the West and the Bay on the East. White's Hill on the South side is also a favourite picnicing place and a good view can be obtained. Sandgate, Wynnum and Manly are favorite watering places and easily accessible by rail, the former from the Central Station, the two latter from Melbourne Street Station. A run down the River to Pinkenba is an enjoyable trip and magnificent views of Fretty Villas and Scenery can be obtained.

SIV By-Law

OLD VERSION

- (7) Membership/Special Interest Vehicle (SIV) Registration
- (a) To qualify for SIV Registration, a new member must be a financial member of The Association for a period of not less than six (6) months and attend a minimum of four (4) Club-sanctioned events within this period.
- (b) It is the responsibility of the new member to keep a record of Club-sanctioned events attended within the six months to be signed and dated by the event run-coordinator and presented to the Dating Officer when requesting Club authorisation.

NEW VERSION

- (7) Membership/Special Interest Vehicle (SIV) Registration
- (a) To qualify for the issue of a SIV Registration Dating Certificate from this club, a member must be a financial member of The Association for a period of not less than six months **and** attend a minimum of four Club-sanctioned events within this period.
- (b) The Membership Officer will issue a SIV Registration Qualification Card to any member wishing to make application for a SIV Registration Dating Certificate.
- (c) It is the responsibility of the member to keep a record on the SIV Registration Qualification Card of the required four Club-sanctioned events attended.
- (d) The card is to be presented by the member to the run-coordinator at each event attended (including General Meetings) to initial as a record of attendance.
- (e) The Dating Officer will check this card against club records prior to issuing a Dating Certificate for the purpose of obtaining SIV Registration.

14. First Aid Officers

- (1) The Association will appoint and maintain a minimum level of two qualified First Aid Officers (FAO) for the provision of first aid where first aid treatment may be required at any club-sanctioned event.
- (2) It is recognised that a FAO is not a medical provider and will not be required to make decisions about medications to be administered in any emergency. First aid is about the immediate emergency treatment or care given to a person suffering from an injury or illness in order to sustain life, to ease pain and to prevent deterioration of the patient's condition until professional medical help can be obtained.
- (3) Emergency services should be called by dialling 000 immediately in any instance requiring more than basic first aid.
- (4) The position of FAO is a voluntary position appointed by the committee. It is not an elected position.
- (5) FAOs are protected by common law and under the terms of the Associations Public Liability and Professional Indemnity insurance policies while undertaking their first aid duties on behalf of The Association. Permission to treat an injured person must always be obtained prior to treatment unless the person is unconscious.
- (6) The committee will call for written nominations to fill two additional FAO positions at each annual general meeting if required to ensure continuous availability of first aid response. There will be a maximum of 10 FAOs sponsored by The Association in any one year.
- (7) Necessary positions will be filled at the next committee meeting following the AGM from nominations received. All applicants will be advised of the outcome of their application in writing by the Secretary. To provide effective first aid the following selection criteria will be considered for appointment of FAOs:
- (a) willingness and enthusiasm to act in this role,
- (b) ability to act calmly and take charge in an emergency,
- (c) evidence of a capacity to deal with injury and illness,
- (d) ability to assess the situation and know when to call for assistance,
- (e) ability to relate well to other members,
- (f) have no health problems or disabilities that are likely to impede performance of first aid activities,
- (g) commitment to attend the CRCC annual swap meet, show and shine event, and
- (h) remain a financial, active member of the club.
- (8) Successful applicants will agree to undergo training by a registered training organisation as arranged by The Association to attain and maintain a current nationally recognised certificate of achievement in basic first aid and cardio pulmonary resuscitation.
- (9) The cost of initial training to attain certification and any subsequent renewal of that certification will be met by The Association upon a

By-Law 14—First Aid 'continued'

written commitment by applicants to make themselves available as first aid responders at the association's annual swap meet, show and shine and any other events at which they are present.

- (10) The Association will provide adequate resources to allow FAOs to carry out their role.
- (11) Duties of nominated FAOs include:
- (a) Attend training on a regular basis to refresh first aid knowledge and skills keeping current their first aid and CPR accreditation by a registered training organisation.
- (b) Maintain a record of any first aid treatment given. This record should be kept by the FAO and a copy provided to the management committee for review of any first aid arrangements
- (c) Maintaining the first aid kit in a hygienic, safe and serviceable condition. Ensuring that:
- (i) content of the kit is appropriate and adequate,
- (ii) any items are replaced as soon as possible after use, and
- (iii) all items remain within their use-by date.

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






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
